#### **Dear Participants,**

The increasing growth in world population and scarcity of renewable resources are raising concerns about various crises worldwide. In this context, food insecurity stands as a serious challenge to many countries around the world, including many of the OIC member countries.

According to the latest SESRIC report on Agriculture and Food Security in OIC member countries, being a substantial part of the developing countries, the OIC countries are no exception from prevalence of undernourishment. In 2018, the OIC member countries were a home of almost 176 million undernourished people (i.e., 10.5% of the total population of the OIC member countries), and that is corresponding to 26% of the world's total undernourished people.

Given this state of affairs, the efficient management and control of food loss and waste become, among others, a crucial issue to be considered in the efforts of the OIC member countries towards improving their state of food security level. According to the FAO, nearly one-third of food produced for human consumption is lost or wasted globally, which amounts to about 1.3 billion tonnes per year. The global dilemma of food loss and waste could be controlled and addressed at both micro and macro levels by adopting pertinent policies and raising awareness. The responsibility falls on the shoulders of all stakeholders, including consumers, manufacturers and governments, through collective efforts towards achieving more sustainable patterns of production and consumption to ensure more food for all, better livelihood, and economic growth.

It is worth mentioning here that through wise management of food loss at harvest level and early stages of the supply chain and shifting the behavioural norms of the consumers away from waste, communities can positively contribute to two SDGs. These are SDG 2 (Zero Hunger) and SDG 12 (Responsible Production and **Consumption**).

This would also contribute to cutting greenhouse gas emissions and reduce the negative environmental impact on food that are threatening our planet and the sustainability of the food sector.

Within the scope of its mandated areas of statistics, research and training, our Centre (SESRIC) has, over the years, initiated and implemented many programmes and activities in the domain of Agriculture development and Food Security for the benefit of the OIC member countries. Mainly, within the framework of our Agriculture and Food Security Capacity Building Programme, we have been, for almost two decades, organising training courses, training workshops, and study visits on various technical aspects related to agriculture sector development.
